

10th Sunday, Ordinary Time - YEAR B 9th June 2024

<u>Reflection on Mark 3: 20-35 (10th Sunday Ordinary Time – Liturgical Year B)</u>

In today's gospel passage we see some of the frustrations Jesus had to contend with. Jesus had to contend with the constant opposition from his enemies and sometimes even misunderstanding from his own family.

A nine year old asks his father, "Dad, how do wars start?" "Well, son," his father began, "take World War 1. That war started when Germany invaded Belgium...." "Just a minute," his wife interrupted. "It began when Arch-duke Francis Ferdinand of Austria was assassinated by a Serbian nationalist." "Well, dear, that was the spark that ignited the fighting, but the political and economic factors leading to the war had been in place for some time." "Yes. I know honey, but our son asked how the war began and every history book says that the World War 1 began with the murder of Archduke Ferdinand of Austria." Drawing himself up with an air of superiority, the husband snapped, "Are you answering the question, or am I?" The wife turned her back on him in a huff, stalked out of the room and slammed the door behind her. When the dishes stopped rattling, an uneasy silence followed. The nine-year old then broke the silence: "Dad, you do not have to say any more about how wars start. I understand now."

Wars begin long before the first shot is fired; houses collapse well before the first crack in the foundation; families fall apart long before the first slammed door. When our own needs come before the common good, when we cannot see or refuse to see things from the perspective of the other person, when the accumulation of wealth and the pursuit of status take the place of the things of God, "war" is certain to destroy the family's unity, the circle of friendship.

Such hardness of heart and self-centeredness fuel the conflict in today's Gospel. Jesus provokes two reactions from his hearers that are direct opposite to what he has said and done to this point. First, Jesus who calls his disciples to be a united "house" is dismissed by his own "house" as "out of his mind." His family was concerned about his physical and mental health, but Jesus was more concerned about the spiritual health of the people he was dealing with.

Second, Jesus who has cast out demons and cured the sick is charged with being possessed himself. The scribes cannot grasp the single-minded dedication of Jesus to the will of God without the "filters" of their interpretations and traditions; hence, he must be an agent of Satan.

Jesus comes to be a vehicle of unity among God's people, to reconcile humanity to God and to one another, to instil a deeper understanding of our sacred dignity as being made in God's image, to restore a renewed commitment to relations and belonging with one another. Christ destroys the barriers created by race, tribe, wealth, and social status. He speaks of a new, united human family - the family of God. We are called, as the Church of the new covenant, to seek in every person the humanity we all share that comes from God, the Father of all and the Giver of everything that is good.



GOSPEL

Jesus came home with his disciples. Again the crowd gathered, making it impossible for them even to eat. When his relatives heard of this they set out to seize him, for they said, "He is out of his mind." The scribes who had come from Jerusalem said, "He is possessed by Beelzebul,"



Summoning them, he began to speak to them in parables, "How can Satan drive out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand. And if Satan has risen up against himself and is divided, he cannot stand; that is the end of him. But no one can enter a strong man's house to plunder his property unless he first ties up the strong man. Then he can plunder the house. Amen, I say to you, all sins and all blasphemies that people utter will be forgiven them. But whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit will never have forgiveness, but is guilty of an everlasting sin." For they had said, "He has an unclean spirit." His mother and his brothers arrived. Standing outside they sent word to him and called him. A crowd seated around him told him, "Your mother and your brothers and your sisters are outside asking for you.' But he said to them in reply, "Who are my mother and my brothers?" And looking around at those seated in the circle he said, "Here are my mother and my brothers. For whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother."
